I. Limit of Enrollment Years: 1. Minimum years of enrollment: 1 year 2. Maximum years of enrollment: 4 years (excluding 2 years of suspension)	Part-time students may extend years of enrollment for 1 more year.												
II. Minimum credits for graduation (physical education and citizen national defense education are not included): <u>42</u> credits These credits include: 1. Courses: Minimum of required credits: <u>9</u> Minimum of elective credits: <u>27</u> 2. Master Thesis: <u>6</u> credits	Students who score 70 or above on both academic and conduct assessments are considered to have passed. Students who fail in conduct will be dismissed. The average academic grade comprises 50% of the overall graduation grades. *Required credits + Elective credits + Master Thesis = Minimum credits for graduation												
III. Transfer credits: maximum <u>15</u> credits	According to NCHU regulations for credit exemption, students should apply for credit exemption and complete the process within two weeks after the start of classes in the semester. This process can only be done once.												
IV. Elective courses related to the undergraduate program can be counted toward the graduated degree credits.	Elective courses taken at the undergraduate level will not count toward the graduation credits of the graduate program. However, if graduate students take courses offered jointly for senior undergraduate and master's students, a maximum of 12 credits will count toward their graduation credits.												
V. Credits from other departments: maximum <u>6</u> credits.	Limited to relevant courses at the master's level (inclusive) or above, as approved by the director (including inter-institutional course credits).

Prerequisite Courses (not included in graduation credits): The director or advisor may require additional requirements based on the individual student's academic progress, which will not be explicitly specified.	According to NCHU graduate regulations, students should take certain prerequisite courses at the undergraduate level, which advisors and the chairperson decide. Prerequisite credits will not be counted as graduation credits. Students cannot attend the thesis defense until they complete the prerequisite courses.												

<p>VIII. Thesis Defense:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Students must consult with their advisor before their first academic year ends. 2. Students must obtain a certificate of completion for academic ethics education before applying for their dissertation defense. Each department (institute or degree program) determines the qualification for this requirement. 3. Students who have completed the minimum required years of study, fulfilled all required courses and credits and finished a draft of their research dissertation may submit their application for the dissertation defense at least 20 days before the scheduled defense date after completing registration and course selection for that semester. A passing score for the dissertation defense is 70 points. 	<p>The oral defense comprises 50% of the graduation grade.</p> <p>Graduate students may complete self-study through the Taiwan Academic Ethics Education Resource Center website and pass the final exam to obtain a course completion certificate. If departments (institutes or degree programs) require students to pass a specific professional academic research ethics education course, it will be implemented according to the respective department's (institute or program's) regulations.</p> <p>If a student fails the dissertation defense but has not yet exceeded the maximum study period, they may apply for a retake in the following academic year or semester. If they fail the retake, they will be dismissed. If they pass the retake, their score will be recorded as 70 points.</p>
<p>IX. Other Information:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. English Proficiency Graduation Requirements: The following are acceptable proofs of English proficiency for graduation: The "General English Proficiency Test" (GEPT) is Intermediate or Advanced level (including the initial exam). Passing the university's own English proficiency test. A certificate with a score of 400 or above on the university's "EnglishScore Core Skills Test." A score of 523 or above on the "TOEFL ITP" (Paper-based Test). A score of 193 or above on the "TOEFL CBT" (Computer-based Test). A score of 69 or above on the "TOEFL iBT" (Internet-based Test). A score of 5.5 or above on the "IELTS." A score of PET (Preliminary English Test) or above on the "Cambridge Certificate" from the University of Cambridge. A score of 70 or above on each section of the "FLPT" English written test. A score of 670 or above on the "TOEIC." Other certificates recognized by the Ministry of Education with an equivalent testing standard to the "GEPT" Intermediate or Advanced level (including the initial exam). Alternatively, applicants who pass the English proficiency check according to the graduate program's standards may also meet the requirement. 2. Minimum Elective Credit Requirements for Each Course Area: For professional electives, students must complete at least 3 credits in each of the following areas: "Public Policy" (PP), "Public Administration" (PM), and "Local Affairs" (LA), totaling a minimum of 9 credits. 3. Initial Approval Based on the "Graduate Admissions, Study, and Degree Examination Implementation Guidelines" and related regulations established thereunder. 	<p>According to Article 2 of the "Regulations for the English Proficiency Graduation Standards for Students of National Chung Hsing University," departments and institutes are authorized to set their own English proficiency graduation standards for graduate students (established at the 57th Academic Affairs Meeting on March 26, 2009).</p> <p>This institute's English proficiency evaluation criteria are implemented based on these standards.</p> <p>These criteria and the relevant graduate student regulations are publicly available on the institute's website for reference by graduate students.</p>
